Te Manawapouhihiri

Overview

Te Manawapouhihiri is a strategic framework that supports the declaration that our kaupapa will perpetuate and give life to mātauranga ā-iwi, ā-hapū, and ā-whānau in the creation of ourselves to fully live as Raukawa in our today and tomorrow.

Te Manawapouhihiri is our Raukawa house of learning a distinctive house of knowledge that sets us apart from everyone else. The design, the name, and the development of Te Manawapouhihiri were guided by our people. Their voices informed us that our house of learning must lead our people to live as Raukawa no matter where they are in the world, 'kia tū Raukawa i te ao.'

Key Outcomes

- Provides guidance to the design, delivery and dissemination of programmes and initiatives that actively fosters an integrated wellbeing approach while contributing to the revitalisation and normalisation of our reo, culture and identity.
- Enables Raukawa uri to strengthen our understanding of what it means to fully live as Raukawa māi i te kōpū ki te kōpū.
- Acts as a catalyst for engaging or re-engaging in our reo, culture and identity across a number of kaupapa ā-iwi pathways which enables our people to engage at any point of their lives.
- The learnings are collective and held in our rich environment.

Key Focus Areas

- **Pou Tangata** connects Raukawa uri to their cultural heritage and enables uri to express themselves proudly and creatively as hapū and iwi citizens.
- **Pou Whenua** connects Raukawa uri to their marae, whenua, waterways and significant sites.
- **Pou Atua** connects Raukawa uri to their tribal and hapū customs and protocols, underpinned by hapū and iwi values and beliefs.
- **Pou Kai** connects Raukawa uri to their tohu taiao guided by the maramataka, including reclaiming the language of their whenua and reconnecting to their own taiao through traditional practices.
- **Pou Kōrero** connects Raukawa uri to their oral histories through their speaking of Te Reo o Raukawa in their everyday lives.





Te Whare Kōrero o Raukawa

Overview

Te Whare Kōrero o Raukawa is an annual week-long wānanga aimed at improving the knowledge, confidence and capability of Raukawa reo speakers and learners.

Our marae-based wānanga explores Raukawa history, language, whakapapa, whaikōrero, karanga, karakia, mōteatea, tikanga and reconnecting our people to our significant sites and traditional practices.

Each kaupapa is taught by high calibre tutors who specialise in reo and tikanga. Included is a basic level class using Te Ataarangi and a tamariki programme enabling parents to attend while their child takes part in a fun-filled programme.

Our wānanga is open to all; however, priority is given to Raukawa uri and people with a strong affiliation to our iwi and rohe. Te Whare Kōrero o Raukawa is usually scheduled to take place in January each year during the school holidays.

Each kaupapa is taught by high calibre tutors who specialise in reo and tikanga. Included is a basic level class using Te Ataarangi and a tamariki programme enabling parents to attend while their child takes part in a fun-filled programme.

Our wānanga is open to all; however, priority is given to Raukawa uri and people with a strong affiliation to our iwi and rohe. Te Kura Reo o Raukawa is usually scheduled to take place in April each year during the school holidays.

Ngā Wānanga ā-Rohe

Overview

Ngā Wānanga ā-Rohe is a series of regional wānanga that aim to assist intermediate to high level reo Māori learners with activities focusing on improving fluency and confidence in whaikōrero, karanga, waiata, whakapapa, karakia, tikanga and kōrero tuku iho.

The programme aims to foster skilled and confident speakers throughout our takiwā across our 16 Raukawa marae who are able to uphold tikanga, utilise mātauranga ā-iwi, and uphold the mana of Raukawa paepae. Our programme is provided via four groupings that reflect the traditional landscape of our takiwā and make it easier for our marae and whānau to wānanga at a local level.

Te Ūkaipō

Overview

Te Ūkaipō is a marae-based wānanga for whānau who have a desire to reclaim, restore and reactivate traditional Raukawa birthing and parenting practices.

The programme is inspired by the stories of Tūrongo, Māhinaarangi, and the birth of Raukawa and is designed to empower participants to meet their Raukawa cultural aspirations as a whānau. The programme provides a culturally safe space for whānau to explore and learn about traditional pre-natal, birthing and post-natal options that support māmā, pēpi, and whānau.

- Normalising traditional Raukawa birthing and parenting practices and rituals among Raukawa whānau and hapū

Te Rourou Iti ā-Haere

Overview

Te Rourou Iti ā-Haere is a collection of waiata released across three series of waiata collections. Our project aims to support the revitalisation of te reo Māori and mātauranga ā-iwi o Raukawa by providing waiata resources (audio files and lyrics) that are meaningful, engaging and easy to access.

Together, the compilation includes commonly sung waiata heard throughout the takiwā and beyond, along with waiata from Mōtai Tangata Rau. Many different whānau and groups took part in the recordings, reflecting the diversity of our iwi and takiwā.

The compilation serves to support personal or group learning, wānanga and also our 16 paepae across the takiwā. Our waiata are across a number of platforms, making it easy to download, stream or add to your playlist. Whether you're doing chores, at mahi or out for a jog, it's easy to push play and get your waiata gains each day.

Te Oriori o Raukawa

Overview

Te Oriori o Raukawa is a traditional chant, 12 verses in its entirety, that draws on mātauranga ā-iwi.

Our tūpuna had many ways in which they passed on mātauranga to their tamariki and mokopuna. One method of intergenerational transmission was through the practice of chanting oriori. We have taken this practice and composed an oriori for our iwi that encapsulates our rich history.

The oriori is imbued with traditional knowledge that strengthens and unlocks our potential to reconnect to our mātauranga ā-iwi o Raukawa. Every verse is symbolic of the sacred passage that marks key cultural rites and events in our lives mai i te kōpū ki te kōpū.

- The revitalisation of matauranga ā-iwi pathways
- The reconnection to our cultural ways of doing and being
- To provide a tool that encourages intergenerational transmission and seeks a commitment to living as Raukawa in our everyday lives



Raukawa Settlement Journey

Overview

Tai Whakaea, Raukawa Settlement Journey is a project that centres on preserving and chronicling the experiences of our iwi during the settlement of our historical treaty claims with the Crown.

It highlights the negotiations between Raukawa and the Crown and how our iwi achieved settlement. It explores the settlement process, the many difficulties we faced and how each challenge was overcome. Our journey is explored and recounted through the voices of those who were intimately involved in the settlement process.

The project seeks to preserve this important kōrero for future generations, and to acknowledge and commemorate the inter-generational efforts of our people to address the many historical breaches and failings of the Crown and New Zealand Government.

Huia Kaimanawa

Overview

Huia Kaimanawa is our Raukawa taonga room located at Te Whare o Raukawa, Tokoroa. Our pātaka of treasures is an ongoing labour of love.

Here at Raukawa it is our responsibility to protect, maintain and preserve the integrity of a wide range of taonga that are currently in our care.

Since the late 1980s, a collection of taonga has been collated that reflects moments of time and memories of a bygone era. These taonga include artefacts, archaeological finds, contemporary taonga, gifts, awards, trophies, healing stones, archives, photos, maps, research publications and much more.

Huia Kaimanawa provides a place for our people to come and see, touch and learn about the many taonga we look after. We have artefacts that are carbon dated to the 1500s, from elaborate pieces to common everyday tools and implements.

As kaitiaki, we are both recognised and certified by the Ministry of Culture and Heritage to hold and care for artefacts. We have over 200 hundred taonga on display, each taonga has a story to tell and we look forward to sharing those stories with you.

Pūhuruhurutanga is an initiative that assists whānau to reclaim, restore and reactivate traditional practices that culturally supports and guides tamariki to transition safely from childhood into adulthood.
